

What is feminism?

Feminism = a range of political movements, ideologies, and social movements that share a common goal: to define, establish, and achieve political, economic, personal, and social equality of sexes (Wikipedia)

Feminism = the advocacy of women's rights on the ground of the equality of the sexes (Oxford)

Feminist = a **person** who believes in the social, political, and economic equality of the sexes (Ngozi Adichie TED talk/Beyonce song)



Caveats of the book

1. Does not address intersectionality well

2. Addresses gender from a binary perspective



Intersectionality


(n.) a theory that considers that various human aspects, such as race, sexual orientation and gender, **do not exist isolated** and separated from each other, **but have complex, influential and interwoven relationships, and those relationships are essential to understanding of the human condition** (Wikipedia)



The Gender Spectrum








Know the Enemy

The Enemy: The Mansplainer

"The Mansplainer is smarter than you; ergo, let him just break it down for you real quick. His delivery is typically patronizing or condescending, often inaccurate, and completely lacks nuance – but comes at you, without variation, as gospel."

The Saboteur: The Humble Bragger

"She's #blessed to have been granted a full scholarship, "grateful" (and "surprised!") to have been promoted, and feels #lucky – not *proud* – to have won a prestigious award."

The Fight Moves:

- Don't deprecate
- > Just the Facts
- > Find a Boast Bitch

Booby Traps

The Trap: "You don't look like an engineer (or scientist)"

"Wenger... was asked to appear in a recruiting ad for her company.

Commuters thought Wenger was too pretty to be a "real" engineer."

The Hack: Twirl on Them Haters

"Wenger started a hashtag, #ILookLikeAnEngineer."






Get Your Speak On

Verbal Tripwire: Hedging

"Think of these words as a kind of performative maybes... They are permission words: used to lessen the impact of an utterance or qualify a statement to make you sound equivocal... Perhaps this is why we use qualifiers to begin with: to sound less assertive, softer, less pushy, less demanding."



WWJD – What would Josh do?

Carry yourself with the confidence of a mediocre white man

WWJD? Don't Hope, Ask

"In her book Women Don't Ask, Linda Babcock describes two types of people: turnips, those who see little merit in asking for what they want (who perceive their environment as unchangeable) and oysters, who see situations as adaptable and look for ways to improve them (they see the world as their oyster)."

Femulate Him:

- ✓ Be an Oyster
- ✓ Have a Counterplan for No




Overarching themes of the book

- 1. Women emulating "male" qualities
 - 1. Why are these associated with men?
- 2. Men (and sometimes women) depicted as bad guys
 - 1. Does this bring the feminist movement forward?
 - 2. How do we help men be allies?

Rules of the FFC at CSU

- 1. You must talk about the Feminist Fight Club at CSU.
- 2. You MUST talk about the Feminist Fight Club at CSU.
- 3. We fight PATRIARCHY (and all forms of harassment, bullying, inequity, discrimination, -isms, and -phobias), not each other.
- 4. Membership to the FFC means you've taken an oath to help and support women –ALL women and those from historically marginalized groups.
- 5. The FFC is inclusive and non-hierarchical. Everyone's an equal fighter.
- 6. The fight is not over until we have achieved gender equity for all people.
- 7. No wallflowers. Everyone must fight!
